A unique financial education model that uses a bilingual, peer educator approach, 'Let's Talk Money' recruits, employs and skills up women from diverse cultural backgrounds to deliver practical, tailored financial literacy and money management workshops to women in their own language and communities, covering:

- financial goal-setting
- budgeting and saving
- banking
- loans and debt
- tenancy and contracts
- tax and super
- Centrelink services.



# Project Aims



Improve the financial literacy and capability of women from migrant and refugee backgrounds.



Increase women's inclusion and participation in civic life with sound financial knowledge.



Break down linguistic, cultural and structural barriers to accessing financial knowledge.



Promote leadership skills in women from migrant and refugee backgrounds.

# Why this Project?

Newly-arrived refugee and migrant women face particular barriers to economic participation and security due to:

- a lack of financial information in their first language and difficulties accessing interpreter services
- cultural attitudes to money make accessing and dealing with financial institutions and government income-support agencies difficult
- jargon and language used by financial institutions
- a lack of tailored financial information.
- social isolation

## Women's Economic Equality Snapshot

Economic security allows people to live with dignity and cover essential needs sustainably, however research clearly shows that the majority of Australian women are faced with an unequal economic reality and future:

- 14.1% gender pay gap, and greater for migrant and refugee women
- women earn 87.6 cents to every dollar earned by men
- interrupted career patterns due to caring responsibilities
- employment in lower-paying sectors and occupations
- women retire with just half the superannuation savings of men.

Financial literacy is crucial to women having the ability to make informed financial decisions and improve their economic status and long-term wellbeing. A lack of financial literacy is a known barrier to inclusion and participation in civic life.
